LEWIS ROBERTSHAW WINS SCT APPRENTICE OF THE YEAR 2021



Lewis Robertshaw is the winner of Stubbing Court Training Ltd's Apprentice of the Year award for 2021. The 18-year-old, who commutes daily from Bradford to work for showjumpers William and James Whitaker near Huddersfield, has shown tremendous commitment and eagerness to learn since he started his SCT apprenticeship in the winter of 2019. Chris Bartle, world-renowned coach to Britain's Olympic senior eventing team, former Olympian and Badminton winner, judged the final of the SCT Apprentice of the Year competition with Award sponsor Anna Goodley, Director of Lycetts Insurance Brokers at Speetley EC, Chesterfield, on Monday 5 July. The other finalists were Cottagers Plot

apprentice Ellie Wilson and KH Equestrian apprentice Kacey Sturrock and the standard was extremely high. Chris said: "It was a very difficult decision to make between three equally motivated, keen young people, whom I enjoyed teaching today. Lewis showed great potential and trainability and has all the attributes to make a successful professional in the horse industry." After completing his GSCEs in 2019, Lewis started a course at an equestrian college, but dropped out after three weeks. The chance to spend a week helping the Whitakers at a show led to an apprenticeship with SCT. He passed his Level 2 Apprenticeship with a Distinction and commenced his Level 3 Apprenticeship in January. He has groomed at the Lottery-funded World Class programme training sessions for William Whitaker, as well as at international shows in the UK and abroad. He won a £250 prize, generously sponsored by Lycetts Insurance Brokers.

ELLIE WILSON: GROOMING AT HOUGHTON HALL INTERNATIONAL



am an Advanced Apprentice at Cottagers Plot EC based near Grimsby, working for Sophie Brown. Cottagers Plot is a BHS approved Riding School and Livery Yard and a Pony Club Centre. Working at a riding school that also offers livery and schooling and houses Sophie's event horses means that I get lots of different opportunities. Recently one of these opportunities was being able to groom at Houghton Hall International Horse Trials for Sophie. We took 2 horses Sarchie and Rodger. Sarchie was in the 3* Long and Rodger in the 2* Long.

We left on the Wednesday morning ready for the Trot up that was later on in the afternoon. We wanted to leave in plenty of time to get both Sarchie and Rodger settled in for the rest of the week. Before leaving I bathed both horses and packed the lorry for the week. I made a checklist to ensure I did not forget anything. I found that when going to an international there is a lot more to pack for the horses. For example, we had to prepare the back of the lorry to pack their haylage and hard feed, mucking out tools and rugs. Both horses went plaited and bathed ready for their Trot up. When arriving at Houghton Hall we parked up then went to find the stables for the week. We prepared them (filled up water buckets, put a hay net up and bedded them down), then unloaded the horses and let them settle before their Trot up. I then assisted Sophie in unpacking the lorry. We took a tack trunk to the stables and took the horses' rugs up. Once unpacked it was time for the horses Trot Up. I got Sarchie and Rodger ready, they were plaited up, groomed, and had their bridles on with their bridle numbers and fleeces to walk up to the Trot up. We took them both together due to the stables being a distance from the Trot up and both horses had their trot up times quite close together. Once they both passed the Trot up, we put them back into their stables. I took the plaits out and ensured they were settled.

Later that evening Sophie and I took both Sarchie and Rodger on a hack around Houghton Hall for a leg stretch. Once ridden they were given their haylage, hard feed and water, skipped out and ready for the night. We did a night check at 9pm to check they were relaxed and had eaten up their feeds. The format of this event was Trot up on Wednesday for both horses. Sarchie had his dressage test on Thursday, Rodger's test was on Friday and both horses then had cross country on Saturday and show jumping on the Sunday. I worked to ensure the horses were comfortable and relaxed during the week. In the morning we fed the horses and gave them haylage. Both horses were hand grazed at least wice a day. This is important as it gets the horses out of their stables. During the day there would be a plan of what time Sophie wanted to work the horses, planned around her competition times. Both horses were bathed each day to make sure they looked clean and white especially Sarchie due to him being grey! I regularly checked the horses to make sure they were showing their 'normal' behaviour. They had their temperature taken twice a day and before coming to Houghton Hall for biosecurity rules. Each time I took their temperature I also had to record it to monitor their health. Thier temperature should be between 37-38.5 C. Houghton Hall was a great opportunity to work together as a team and also to improve my organisational skills. I really enjoyed the opportunity and learnt so many things throughout the week, such as about the different rules in an international event and the difference between national and international events. I'm really looking forward to the next event that I



am able to groom at.
